

JENESYS2019 ASEAN Inbound Program 14th Batch Program Report Theme: Culture and Art Exchange Country: Singapore

1. Program Overview

11 university undergraduate/graduate students from Singapore visited Japan for a period of eight nights from December 2 to 10, 2019 as part of JENESYS 2019 under the theme of "Culture and Art Exchange". The delegations visited Tokyo National museum and art museums in Tokyo, as well as visited historical buildings in Kyoto to observe traditional crafts and arts which is inherited for many years. In Nara prefecture, thorough the experience of Home-stay program, they interacted with local people and deepened their understanding of Japan in various ways. During the program, the participants shared their discoveries and experiences in Japan through Social Media. At a reporting session before leaving Japan, the group presented an action plan (activity plans after returning home) to convey their experience while visiting Japan.



4. Feedback from the participants (excerpt as written)

- ◆ Through this program, I learned that Japanese students were raised up surrounded by culture and arts from childhood, and given enough opportunities to learn its technics at school. 
5. Feedback from the hosts (excerpt)
